



Despite their name, White Rhinos are not actually white. They are usually a grey or brownish colour, although their skin can appear lighter in certain lighting conditions.

They are the second-largest land mammal and can weigh up to 2,300 kg (5,000 lbs) and stand over 1.8 meters (6 feet) tall at the shoulder.

Their horn is made of keratin fibres, the same as human hair or fingernails.

Adult White Rhinos have 2 horns, with the front horn being longer than the rear horn.

White Rhinos have a symbiotic relationship with oxpeckers, a type of bird that feeds on ticks and parasites that live on the rhino's skin. The rhino provides a meal for the oxpecker, while the bird helps to keep the rhino's skin free of parasites.

They can live up to 50 years in the wild.

They have a slow reproductive rate, with females giving birth to one calf every two to three years.
